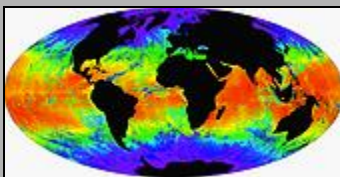

#### *Budapest*

The “LL.M. in U.S. and Global Business Law” is a unique opportunity for international lawyers to acquire a U.S. master’s degree without having to devote a year to obtaining it, taking extended time off work, or paying for the cost of living and tuition in the U.S. The two way cooperation between Suffolk University Law School in Boston and Eotvos Lorand University in Budapest, along with the administrative support of CILS, marks a ground breaking step towards the internationalization of legal education.

The program began in 2006. Dean Aman gave a lecture this past summer, in 2007 Judge Nancy Gertner came to give a lecture, and in 2006 we had a talk by the former President of Hungary. The focus of the program is U.S. and international business law, so the courses are very advanced and specific to the needs of the degree candidates, such as, Complex Business Litigation in the U.S.; U.S. Federal Securities Regulation; International Project Finance; U.S. Law, e-Business and the Internet; Domestic and International Arbitration; and U.S. Corporate Finance Law. Over the course of a number of summers, candidates for the degree earn 6 credits

in each two-week, full-time summer session in Hungary, and 2 more credits for courses or research projects each year, towards the required total of 24 credits. An innovation we have developed that has turned out to be very successful is the provision of online courses to be taken during the academic year, such as, U.S. Commercial Paper and Payment Systems; Secured Loans under the U.C.C. art. 9; Intellectual Property Law Survey; and Global Internet Law. In 2008, there were over 70 lawyers in Budapest at different stages of progress towards the degree, from places as far away as Honduras and the Philippines, New Zealand, Argentina, South Africa, and, as close as Germany, Italy, and Albania. In total, 30 countries were represented within the three class sections. Some had substantial legal experience in their local jurisdiction representing international clients, and some were young lawyers advancing their careers. The average age of the degree candidates since 2006 has been over 37 years. Thirty six percent of them are over 40 years old. On average, they have twelve years of legal practice, but fifty five percent of them have over 10 years of legal experience. These statistics are revealing, because they clearly establish that the program achieves a very high level of sophistication and adds educational value to lawyers with as much as thirty years of legal experience, in some cases.

Most importantly, and this is very exciting for us, we will graduate the first class to earn the LL.M. in U.S. and Global Business Law at the Suffolk University Law School Commencement Ceremony in May 2009. About 25 lawyers from all over the world will come to receive their diplomas; along with the 2009 graduating LL.M.'s from Boston, and the exchange students, who all join in the program and the weekend's festivities.

### *2008 Spring Graduation*

On May 18, 2008, the LL.M. class joined the rest of Suffolk University for graduation and celebratory festivities. We hosted a Champagne Brunch on Saturday for the LL.M. and Exchange students and their families and friends. It was a

proud moment for everyone and to share the achievements of our students.

### *Welcome to the incoming LL.M. Fall 2008 and Spring 2009 Classes*



In August 2008, The Office of Graduate and International Programs hosted a 3-day Orientation for our new class. Students enjoyed the Orientation Program and reception. We are hosting five exchange students from Lund, Sweden and twenty-eight LL.M. students coming from 14 different countries including Trinidad, Germany, China, Mexico, Lithuania, Egypt, Nigeria, India, France, Italy, Venezuela, Brazil, Dominican Republic and Turkey. Fifty three percent of our incoming class is comprised of international students while 25% are U.S. citizens and 21% are permanent residents.

On a cold day in January, we welcomed eight more LL.M. students and one Exchange student. The students come from Bahrain, Jordan, Russia, Sweden, Italy, Brazil and the U.S.

### *Visiting Scholars 2008-2009*



We currently have three Visiting Scholars at the Law School.

**Gwi Sook Lee** is a Criminal Investigator in the Office of the Public Prosecutor in Daegu District, Seoul, South Korea. She received a very prestigious award from the Ministry of Justice in Korea to study abroad, and she is also doing graduate work in law at Dongguk University, Korea. She will be here from October until the end of January 2009. Her research project here at Suffolk will focus on the criminalization of intellectual property offenses, what we used to think of industrial espionage, in the context of the treaty of cooperation between the U.S. and Korea concerning crime.

**Quynh Nguyen** is a Lecturer at Hanoi Law University, Vietnam, teaching Civil Law and Intellectual Property. She is also a Ph.D. candidate in the Sweden - Vietnam doctoral program. She has a Master's degree in Law from Lund, and a number of professional certificates from WIPO, the Max-Planck Institute, and Melbourne, and Tokyo universities. She has published in English, and has been a Consultant to the Vietnam Assembly's Office of Cooperation with the E.U. Her particular topic of interest is the "Exhaustion Doctrine and its Application to Intellectual Property, with Consideration of the Implications for Vietnam." She was here from September until December.

**Judit Beke-Martos** is completing her Ph.D. in legal history at Eotvos Lorand University, Faculty

of Law, Budapest, Hungary. She attended the Suffolk Lund Summer School in 2005, and the program in U.S. Law and Legal Methods, and also will have earned the LL.M. in U.S. and Global Business Law when she graduates in May, 2009. She clerked at Eversheds in Budapest, and Siemens in Paris. She has published in German, English and Hungarian, and has been an invited speaker at a number of legal history conferences in Europe.

Her Ph.D. thesis concerns "The Legal Regulation of State Organized Protocol" which covers events such as coronations, investitures, all aspects of diplomatic relations, and the legitimacy of power from 1867-1918. While at Suffolk, she will compare the conceptual and methodological differences between legal history in civil law jurisdictions and common law jurisdictions. Her primary focus will be on the comparison of the coronation of a monarch and the inauguration of a president as a ritual exemplifying the social and cultural differences between the Catholic Monarchy of the Austrian-Hungarian state and the Protestant Democracy of the U.S. In addition, she will research the different protocols as relating to the assassinations of President William McKinley (1901) and Queen Elizabeth of Austria (1898).

## *Exchange Program Updates*



### **Lund, Sweden**

For Fall 2008, we welcomed to SULLS 3 men and 2 women from the University of Lund. One was originally staying for only one semester, but was so enthusiastic about her experience that she has decided to stay for the Spring 2009 semester. We welcomed one new exchange student in Spring 2009. They are studying a whole range of courses here at Suffolk from intellectual property to human rights to contracts. We had 2 visiting J.D. students at Lund University this past fall as part of our exchange agreement.

## *Boston Internship Program*



There has been growing interest on the part of students to gain practical experience while they simultaneously pursue their LL.M. The advantage of our Boston Internship Program is that students receive one-on-one counseling and targeted job search assistance. Assistant Director, Alane De Luca continues to work with interested students and arranging meetings with local firms and organizations. Any connections you may have are always welcomed and greatly appreciated.

One of many valuable resources is attending the Boston Bar Association, Foreign Lawyers Committee meetings held at 16 Beacon. The BBA offers a wealth of information for our students and committees revolving around different areas of law.

Despite economic woes across the country, companies and firms continued to offer internships as a means of attracting qualified personnel. Hosts were most often intrigued with our global focus within the LL.M. program and the unique set of skills and background that our students bring. State Street Corporation sought Suffolk LL.M. students specifically for 2 to 3 coveted internship positions and the Associate Counsel made a presentation at the law school about its expanding global initiatives. Further, directed outreach to the Massachusetts Office on Disability, Boston Consulting, Pegasystems Inc., DLA Piper, the Berkman Center for Internet & Society, CPI & GPC Magazine, K Sports Entertainment and the Screen Actors Guild-Boston, among others, led to several new internship opportunities. A total of eight students accepted Boston-area internships and will begin their for-credit assignments in January 2009.

## *International Internship Program Summer 2008*



“Anywhere you want to go” was the theme for this past summer’s interns.

Suffolk Law School partners with the dedicated staff from The Center for International Legal Studies, Salzburg, Austria to offer this unique

program to J.D. and LL.M. students from law schools across the U.S. We were well poised with legal contacts to offer over 25 selected applicants prime international internship opportunities. Equal numbers of students from Suffolk and non-Suffolk students participated in our International Internship Program. Thirteen SALS students were placed in locations as far away as Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia to sites as close as Toronto, Canada. Students from schools such as New York Law School, UC Hastings, Case Western Reserve, Loyola University Law School, and Hofstra to name a few, sought our program as a complement to achieving their goal in pursuing an international law career.

This speaks to an increased profile nationally for our unique offerings. "Making tea or copying documents" was not part of *this* internship experience. Students shared the importance of balancing their time at an information session held in November. Many interns found that a typical day could well pass 12 to 14 hours. Arming oneself with current affairs and politics of the day was also highly recommended by the panel. Some interns found that they were the first "American introduction" to their host village or town and were in many respects not only a legal intern, but an ambassador of our country.

### *LL.M. LexisNexis Lecture Series*



Professor David Nimmer

As part of our on-going LexisNexis Lecture Series, we were honored to host Professor David Nimmer who lectured to a packed audience about "Culturing Google to Copy Right". Mr. Nimmer is of counsel to Irell & Manella LLP in Los Angeles, California. He also served as a visiting Professor at University of California, Los Angeles Law School and Distinguished Scholar at the Berkeley Center for Law and Technology. Prof. Nimmer was selected for inclusion in Southern California "Super Lawyers" by *Los Angeles Magazine* in 2006, 2007 and 2008. Also, he has been named in *The Best Lawyers in America* for over 10 years. The *Los Angeles and San Francisco Daily Journal* named Mr. Nimmer one of California's "Top 10 Copyright Lawyers" in 2008.

People were amused by his sophisticated PowerPoint slides, but also challenged by the content of the lecture, which described the global proportions of Google's ambitions. As one student remarked afterwards, "I am absolutely amazed by Professor Nimmer's talk. He was able to convey an entire semester's worth of internet law in an hour in a meaningful and thought provoking way! His students are very lucky." Everyone walked away with new found knowledge and a better understanding of this timely and complicated subject. Google is in the news constantly, and the issue between copyright

protection and the free dissemination of information over the Internet will not go away.

This is part of a new and exciting aspect to Suffolk Law School's International Law and Intellectual Property programs which we hope will further cement our niche in the global market.

### *FDI Moot, November 2008*

The inaugural Foreign Direct Investment International Moot Court Competition and Inaugural Conference was held on Friday, October 31 - Sunday, November 2, 2008 at Suffolk University Law School in Boston. It attracted teams from Australia, Argentina, Chile, Costa Rica, Ecuador, Ethiopia, Georgia, Hong Kong, India, Poland, Romania, Russia, Serbia and the United States (there were eight teams from U.S. law schools). The co-founders of the

FDI Moot Competition include the Center for International Legal Studies in Salzburg, Austria; Pepperdine University Law School in California; the University of Dundee's Centre for Energy, Petroleum and Mineral Law and Policy (CEPMLP) in Scotland; the German Institution of Arbitration, Cologne, Germany, and Suffolk University Law School. The international law firm of Skadden, Arps, Slate, Meagher & Flom LLP is sponsoring the FDI Moot, supporting the Skadden, Arps Trophy for the winning team. Oxford University Press is sponsoring the Oxford University Press Awards for Best Written Claimant and Respondent Memorials. A conference was held in conjunction with the Moot Court competition on "Investor-State Arbitration: Perspectives on Legitimacy and Practice" with a lineup headlined by Judge Stephen Schwebel, former president of the International Court of Justice; Professor Jose Alvarez of Columbia University Law School, former president of the American Society of International Law; and Professor David Caron of University of California Berkeley, Boalt School of Law, current Chair of the Institute of Transnational Arbitration. The winning team was Murdoch University from Australia.
