The Bar Guide: A Guide to the Bar of England and Wales (American Lawyer Media and the Bar Council of England and Wales, 2006): This guide explains how American trained lawyers can qualify to practice law in England and Wales. ([Bar Section](#))

Careers in International Law: Your Indispensable Guide to Career Paths and Internships in International Law (American Society of International Law, 2000): This guide offers advice on careers in international law, including law school course selection, interviewing, and the job search, as well as personal narratives from attorneys in various areas of international practice. The guide also includes a list of international law internship opportunities, summaries of each program, and application procedures. ([International Section](#))

Finding and Funding International Public Service Opportunities (NALP, updated 2006): Includes tips on job hunting in the international arena and resume preparation. The guide covers international opportunities with the US government, international courts and tribunals, and international non-profits and non-governmental organizations. It also covers international study opportunities for summer, LL.M. programs, and fellowship information. ([International Section: International Resources binder](#))

Focus Europe (annual supplement to *The American Lawyer*): A magazine on European business law which is a good source on legal trends in Europe and European law firms. ([International Section](#))

Foreign Representatives in the US (Leadership Directories, 2006): Contains up-to-date information on leaders in the U.S. offices of non-U.S. corporations, financial institutions, foreign nations, intergovernmental organizations, and law firms. The "Law Firms" section lists foreign law firms with offices in the U.S. ([International Section](#))

Guide to Education and Career Development in International Law (ILSA 1991): The ILSA Guide provides some practical advice on starting a career in international law for students and recent graduates. Although the guide is over 15 years old, and much of the information on "recent trends" is out of date, the career advice essays are helpful nonetheless. ([International Section](#))

The Human Rights Internship Book (Career Education Institutes, 2004): Provides information on human rights internship programs and opportunities both abroad and in the U.S. Domestic opportunities are organized by state. This guide includes information on the types of internships available, contact information, and how to apply. ([Internship Section](#))

International Information Directory 2000-2001 (Congressional Quarterly, 1999): This comprehensive guide provides information on over 4,500 U.S. agencies, the U.S. Congress, international organizations, and non-profit groups. The guide is arranged by topic and by individual country. Each entry provides contact information and a brief description of the organization and its activities. It also contains additional resources on intergovernmental organizations and the United Nations. ([International Section](#))

International Internships 2004 (Carlyle Corporation, 2004): This book provides information on international internships both in the US and abroad, including descriptions of internship opportunities and required qualifications. *International Internships* is organized alphabetically by organization. Check the individual organization's webpage for up to date contact information. ([Internship Section](#))

International LL.M. Career Planning (Yale Law School, 2006-2007): Although geared towards Yale students, this guide provides valuable advice for foreign LL.M. students pursuing a career with U.S. law firms. It includes information on the LL.M. job market, resources, preparing resumes and cover letters, interviews, and narratives from other LL.M students on their job search. ([International Section](#))

International Public Interest Law (Yale Law School, 2006-2007): This comprehensive guide offers indispensable advice on pursuing a career in international public interest law. The guide provides information on internships and

post-graduate employment with the United Nations, intergovernmental organizations, the U.S. government, and non-governmental organizations. ([International Section: binder](#))

Internships in International Affairs (Career Education Institutes, 2004): Provides information on internship opportunities in international affairs both abroad and in the U.S. Domestic opportunities are organized by state. This guide includes information on the types of internships available, contact information and how to apply. ([International Section](#))

Martindale-Hubbell International Law Digest (Lexis-Nexis, 2006): This volume includes digests of the laws in 82 foreign nations. This is a great resource for those wanting to familiarize themselves with a country's legal system and professional requirements. ([International Section](#))

Martindale-Hubbell International Law Directory (Lexis Nexis 2006): This two volume directory provides information on law firms and law firm associations, as well as professional biographies of attorneys. Organized alphabetically by country, Volume I includes firms in Europe, Asia, Australasia, the Middle East, and Africa. Volume II covers North America, the Caribbean, Central America, and South America. This is a great resource for those targeting firms in a particular country or region. ([International Section](#))

National Jurist (special issues published annually): Every year the National Jurist publishes issues on study abroad programs, working abroad, and international LLM programs. The most recent copies of these annual issues are available in the International section of the library. ([International Section](#))

Opportunities with International Tribunals and Foreign Courts (Yale Law School, 2006-2007): This guide provides information on internship opportunities in international courts. It describes the function and structure of the tribunal, contact information, and the application process. The guide also includes personal narratives of former interns. ([International Section: International Public Interest Law binder](#))

Peace Corps (Various materials): The library contains several resources on the Peace Corps, including brochures and a series of books detailing volunteer experiences. ([Public Interest Section](#))

Post-Graduate International Fellowships (Georgetown University Law Center, 2006): A listing of fellowship opportunities in international law. This list has a short description of the fellowship and a link to the organization or agency's web site. ([International Section: International Resources binder](#))

Public Service and International Law: A Guide to Professional Opportunities in the United States and Abroad (Yale Law School and Harvard Law School, 1998): Although somewhat older, this guide is a good source of information about available public service opportunities in international law, including hiring practices and personal narratives. The book covers opportunities with the UN, intergovernmental organizations, international opportunities with the US government, international non-profit organizations, and international fellowships and grants. ([International Section](#))

Serving the Public: A Job Search Guide, Vol. II – International (Harvard Law School, 2006-2007): An excellent resource for anyone planning a career or seeking an internship in public international law. Part I, an overview of international public interest law, includes information on practice, personal narratives, and sample resumes, cover letters and interview questions. Part II provides an overview of international organizations, the types of work available, and desired qualifications. Part III covers fellowships and grants, print and online resources, and a comprehensive organization listings by practice area. ([Public Interest Section](#))
