Attention MySpace and Facebook.com users: The Career Development Office has learned that some employers are researching applicants by checking out their MySpace and Facebook pages. In some cases, employers have rejected candidates after seeing material on these websites inconsistent with the image of most law firms and corporations. We recommend that you take a close look at your profile, putting yourself in the shoes of a risk-averse employer. Remember that employers are looking for someone they can trust to interact with clients and with sensitive and confidential information. Delete any text or images you wouldn't want a potential employer to see. If you have questions, see a career counselor in the CDO.

Any 2nd or 3rd year student with a valid LexisNexis ID can participate in an online **Certification Program**, which enhances a resume, and grounds students in useful research skills. This can be done entirely online, and here's what you do: Go to <http://webcourses.lexisnexis.com>; click on the red Courses tab at the top of the screen; click on Browse Course Catalog; click on your school; then Enroll in LexisNexis Web Courses. Simply follow the instructions. In Competency, you'll then need to take a National Assessment. Details and access can be found at: <http://www.lexisnexis.com/lawschool/resource/certification/>. Or go to <https://lawclerks.ao.uscourts.gov>. The FLCIS is intended to provide prospective law clerk applicants a single, free, accessible source of information on clerkship opportunities. Vacancy announcements for law clerk positions can be located by searching on type of court, court location, name and type of judge, starting date, "open" or "filled" status, and/or type of clerkship. The announcements will include information on the clerkship term, Application requirements, special hiring criteria, anticipated interviewing and hiring schedules, and the status of the position.

MBF 2008 Legal Intern Fellowship Program – Applications Now Available

The Massachusetts Bar Foundation is pleased to announce the availability of applications for its 2008 Legal Intern Fellowship Program. Law students selected to be Legal Intern Fellows will receive a stipend of \$6,000 to volunteer for ten (10) weeks during the summer months at a nonprofit organization that provides civil legal services to low-income clients in Massachusetts. The Massachusetts Bar Foundation expects to award up to six (6) fellowships for the summer of 2008. All current law students are eligible to apply. The internship must be conducted at a nonprofit organization in Massachusetts that has been in operation for at least one year and has programs dedicated to providing civil legal services to the indigent in Massachusetts.
